up to 25% of this offering for peacemaking efforts that align with their passion and ours will go to the Slinger Food Pantry.



Sadly, First Presbyterian Church of Richfield recently lost another member. **Richard Schmidt** died on September 11, 2024, at his home, the victim of a farm accident. **Pastor Cathy Manthei** presided over the memorial service and burial on September 22 and 23.

Richard was baptized and confirmed at FPCR. He went on to serve the church as a Deacon, Trustee, and Elder. He participated in many FPCR "fix it" projects throughout the years.

Richard grew up and lived on the family farm along with his brother Michael. Together they raised crops and tended cattle. He was a perfectionist about his work and was often seen with a bucket tidying errant weeds

or picking single rocks and stones by hand. Richard loved the land and his chosen vocation. He often said that farming gave him something to look forward to each day.

In addition to farming, Richard liked visiting with family and friends. Many have enjoyed an impromptu visit with Richard that may actually have lasted for multiple hours. He loved to "catch up", talk about his farming ideas, share stories about the children of his

friends, and give a helping hand when needed. At the time of his death, he was excited to be signed up to attend his 50th class reunion from Slinger High School which, unfortunately, was held on September 14.

Richard was the son of Donald and Bernice Schmidt. He is the nephew of **Ken and Elaine Schmidt**, brother of **Bonnie**, **Michael**, and **Karen**. He is the godfather of **Daryl Schmidt** and **Maya Kubsad** (Karen and Shrikant's daughter).

World Communion Sunday will be celebrated at FPCR on October 6. This particular Sunday

celebrates our oneness in Christ with our brothers and sisters around the world.

Appropriately, the annual <u>Peace and</u> <u>Global Witness Offering</u> will be accepted as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with those in need. This special offering is sponsored by PC(USA). FPCR retains 25% for the Slinger Food Pantry; 25% will be mailed to the Synod of Lakes and Prairies for ministries of peace and reconciliation; and 50% will be sent to Presbyterian Church (USA)/ Presbyterian Mission to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. The Peace and Global Witness offering will also be collected on **October 13**.
